

Dear Curl

I am sorry to be sending this funeral folder to you, but thought you would want to know that Ruth Plummer died July 2nd.

As you probably know, the past two years have been difficult for her. Between the osteoporosis and asthma, she seemed to be up and down with one or the other much of the time. Her breathing was affected by the pain caused by broken bones.

About the middle of May a rib broke. That impeded her breathing. She had breathing machine treatments four times a day and oxygen as needed. On June 29th, she was feeling quite good and called Margaret, sugesting she not visit her -- to stay out of the heat. Then, at 7:30 P.M. she was taken to the hospital with cardiac arrest. She did live through that episode, but I think she realized she was nearing the end of her life for in many ways she began telling us goodbye.

Tests Wednesday and Thursday revealed fluid in the lungs. The Thursday test showed a blood clot in the lungs and a larger one in the thigh and smaller ones in her left leg.

Thursday afternoon the doctor attempted to insert a filter to catch the clots so that they could not enter the heart and lungs. Because her organs were not in their proper place, due to the osteoporosis, the filter was not in place.

Friday morning, the doctors took Ruth to radiology to insert dye so as to trace the location of the filter. On the way to radiology, Ruth told the doctors and nurses "I'm 91 years old. I don't want to go through any more of this. It's time to go." And in about two hours she slipped away very quietly and peacefully. Margaret, Dale and Mark (Margaret's husband and son), Barbara and I were with her, holding her hands. Richard and Mary were on their way.

We held services in Council Bluffs because this is where she lived most of her life and where her husband is buried. Friday, July 9th, a memorial service was held at the Liberty Terrace Care Center.

All her grandchildren (except Amy) were here--she dearly loved them and they her.

Our hearts are sad, but we know she will no longer suffer and we are grateful for her long life and the love she gave to each of us.
